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HOPEFUL NEWS FOR LOCUST STREET

S ometimes it takes a nudge, sometimes a push, and sometimes a group of people to talk loudly for a few years. I think by now we are all aware that the 6800 block of Locust ("upper Locust") is in desperate need of street repair. The long block is an unsightly and dangerous bumpy web of varying potholes and asphalt patches symbolic of Kansas City's infrastructure needs. Long-time residents are extremely frustrated with

the rapidly declining situation.

For many years the 311 repair requests have only resulted in occasional and poorly filled potholes, further



reconstruction including total removal and replacement. (I know, no surprise.) We also learned this street repair is not in KCMO's new five-year infrastructure plan that mainly focuses on main arterial streets, with minimal other options.

However, we may have just had a significant breakthrough! Recently we received a message directly from Brian Platt, the new City Manager, prioritizing our 6800 Locust Street block for an

> urgent spring or summer street r e s u r f a c i n g ! That's right – a 2021 repair. This is unexpected and fantastic news. We will continue to follow through, ensuring our

contributing to the street issues. Over the last two years, the 6800 Block Captain and OMG Board of Directors tried a new approach. We have worked together to escalate this much needed street repair request, including demanding supervisor assessments, multiple PIAC funding requests, our city councilman co-involvement, tenacious communications, some outright begging, and not so hopeful rejections from Public Works. We've heard a lot of "no's" while untangling the complicated, overlapping web of city services. We learned the street is officially rated as a zero, meaning it is in need of complete

Locust Street Zero block stays high on that repair list. While a celebration is in order, we will hold off until we see the trucks pull up - after all, we are the Show Me State. Hopefully, we can all sit in our lawn chairs with a cocktail in hand while proudly watching our taxes at work to finally fix our frustrating neighborhood situation.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

DEAR OMG NEIGHBORS,

ne of the attributes that makes Oak Meyer Gardens (OMG) so appealing as a place to live - or move into - is the quality and attractiveness of our common areas - especially our many monuments.

And one of the most important duties of our Homes Association is to provide the upkeep needed to maintain these common areas. Attractive and wellkept plantings in these areas not only provide some of the charm of living in OMG, but also help to maintain our property values.

In our last newsletter. I wrote that the Board plans to make a leveraged application for City PIAC funds to restore our eight, large, gateway markers on 63rd Terrace and on Meyer. If we are successful, these funds would be available in May of 2022. Also, we have learned that performing regular routine maintenance on our markers will be less expensive than waiting until major work is required on them.

Over the past two years, OMG has restored and rebuilt 21 of our existing smaller markers using money mostly from our reserves. With this experience, the Board has developed a preference for one or two masonry companies that we believe provide the best craft at the most reasonable price. Thirty-two of our smaller markers still require major maintenance, something that we hope to provide in the next two fiscal years. One of our preferred

masons has given us an estimate of \$21,000 to complete this work. Once all the monuments have been brought up to a good condition, routine tuck pointing and filling of cracks will be far less expensive - around \$2,000/year. This maintenance will help prevent unnecessary damage caused by the infiltration of water and the freeze/ thaw cycle of our Kansas City weather.


You will see elsewhere in the newsletter that we have a new landscape maintenance contractor. Through our bidding process, we have discovered that we should set aside more money for this expense. Previously we had budgeted \$11,000 to cover both landscape maintenance and plantings. This year we will use most of our budget just for the contractor.

The Board plans to gradually make improvements to the plantings in the common areas around the markers - mostly with perennials that return each year and spread, and by maintaining the boxwoods for winter greenery. We started this effort two vears ago by dedicating \$15,000 from our reserves for improvements. We still have \$6.640 of these reserves which should carry us through the next two to three years. We would like to have the budget to continue these improvements thereafter.

We have a large and energetic Board of Directors that has identified several great ideas for OMG if the

Membership agrees. One idea is to provide salting of the streets in addition to snow plowing. The cost for this is \$350 per occurrence. We have a small committee investigating the possibility of establishing the OMG neighborhood as an Overlay District with the City. The purpose of this is to protect the neighborhood from development that does not match its current character. Fees for this are \$4,000. Finally, we would like to identify the boundaries of the HOA with attractively printed metal markers on the utility poles. We are in the process of researching this.

I mention the expenses throughout this article because most all of them are beyond what we can afford with our existing dues. On average, each owner pays about \$65/year for the services our HOA now provides, whereas our surrounding HOAs pay dues of \$120-150 per year. The Board would like to be able to provide additional services to the OMG Members. Paying an extra say \$30 per year would still be a reasonable amount for dues. This would move us a long way towards being able to both maintain and further enhance the OMG neighborhood as a desirable place to live. AN INTERVIEW WITH LONG-TIME OMG RESIDENT KATE BUSTER

Kate, we live next door to each other so I already know a little about you. You told me you lived in Germany from '78 to '87 and wrote a book to belp Americans moving to Hamburg integrate – which is still being updated to this day. What's the biggest difference between then and now?

When we first moved there, it was difficult to meet Germans, as they were very formal. It has become much, much more relaxed since then. I can imagine it was very appealing back in the seventeen and eighteen hundreds, when it was prairie and forest. Oh, and I once had a neighbor that would climb up high up in a tree, into the foliage, and talk



to the people passing below, startling them. Sometimes he would throw firecrackers! He would also take his gun up there, saying he was protecting the neighborhood. He was a nice guy, just a little strange. I think every block needs some eccentric people to make it interesting!

And what's the biggest change you've seen in the years you've lived here?

The biggest change has to be Academy Lafayette purchasing the school, which was empty & rundown beforehand. There are also more families. It used to be that as soon as couples had children, they would move to Johnson County. And it's getting friendlier all the time - maybe it's thanks to the active board. What I would say is missing in the neighborhood is more

integration, which would make a big difference.

I'm aware you volunteer for the Kansas City Hospice and Palliative Care's Grief Support Team. What has the experience taught you?

What I get out of it is how resilient people are, even people who don't think they're going to be. When I was working for hospice as a social worker with patients, that always struck me the generosity of people letting us into their homes, and their resilience. I've always very proud of people. It gives me hope and encourages me to follow that example and keep on keepin' on!

A bawk perched on a very low branch near your patio last year. What's the most memorable animal encounter *vou've bad in OMG?*

Some years ago, there was a golden eagle in one of the trees across the street. It makes a hawk seem small! That was quite amazing. Other than that, it's foxes, raccoons and possums. There was a white squirrel in my yard for a couple of years. I'm a big nature lover, a gift from my mother. I think it's so cool to see nature in the city.



DOGGY ETIQUETTE 101

Thou shalt not bark to excess outdoors. Excessive **L** barking is a common behavior problem in dogs. The remedies make sense when dog behavior is explained.

Barking is a genetic behavior that has survival advantages for wild dogs, from which pets are descended. Barking warns pack members of danger, a useful trait for pet owners. Some dogs are overly enthusiastic about protecting homes and sound off when "threatened" by a jogger, another animal, or even a car or the plumber.

Isolation is a serious problem for dogs, which are social by nature. Dogs are genetically programmed to be part of a group. We are our pet's "pack." Isolation from the pack makes dogs bored and frustrated, which leads to excessive barking.

Many dogs bark because there is a restriction to their inborn desire for freedom. Chains, fences, and runs tend to upset dogs – leading to barking. Dogs prefer staying in the house with their "pack." Animals may

be "yard dogs" because of undesirable behaviors. A responsible owner corrects his/her dog's behavior for the good of their family and neighborhood.

Solutions to help dogs that bark excessively include:

• Change the dog's environment. Keep the dog indoors; the dog will be happier.

ak Meyer Gardens' pedestals have suffered a plethora of damage this past year. Both pedestals at Holmes and Rockhill were damaged in two separate hit and run incidents, and the north gateway marker at Meyer and Oak was involved in a three-car accident caused by an uninsured motorist. Finally, the south pedestal at 65th Terrace and Oak was toppled by KCMO Water Services equipment while accessing a water valve in order to make repairs. And that was only this past year!

The City paid for the damage they caused at 65th Terrace, but the HOA had to pay the insurance deductible for the other three incidents - a total of \$1,500. This is money that we could have used for improvements to our common areas. In an effort to hopefully avoid future damage to the Holmes and Rockhill markers, as part of their repair, the Board decided to remove the lowest tier of each wall that was closest to the street, the area damaged in each incident.

You can help by checking into any loud noise you hear that sounds like a possible collision with one of our stone pedestals. If you are able to, please get a vehicle description or a license number. Even if the vehicle gets away too quickly, please let us know about the damage so we can get it fixed as soon as possible. The general Board email is hoa@oakmeyergardens.org.

- Establish a leadership role with your pet. The dog will find this reassuring. Walk your dog on a leash daily.
- Go through a formal obedience program with your dog. Your veterinarian will be able to provide recommendations.
- Be consistent with discipline (time out in crate, a sharp "no").
- Do not reinforce barking with attention (positive reinforcement).

If barking persists your veterinarian may have additional advice.

KC ORDINANCES

The general ordinance about pet-owner responsibilities says:

No person shall own or keep any animal which by making excessive noise disturbs a neighborhood.

Excessive noise [is]... animal

noise which is so loud. continuous or untimely as to disturb a neighbor who lives within 100 yards... (Sec. 14-30)

Violations are punishable by fines of \$75-1,000, plus impoundment/boarding charges for animals picked up by an animal control officer.
